## Major Requirements

- 12 hours in each of the 3 fields of study (at least 9 advanced hours in each)
- Students cannot complete 2 fields from the same College or School with the exception of CAS
- Students are responsible for course pre-requisites, but not pre-major courses
- Courses cannot apply toward both an Integrative Studies field and a major/minor
- C or better is required on all courses used in the 3 fields
- Intermediate II level of foreign language is required (LANG 1010, 1020, 2040, 2050) **OR** student may choose to do 2 advanced courses from Option II list instead. Please see CAS counselor for options and selection.
